THEME: TREES

READ

TALK

Talk about words that begin with the letter T, like "tree". Practice saying these words in funny voices (for example, robot, mouse, dinosaur, etc.).

PLAY

Play I Spy outside. Can you spy some trees? What color are their leaves?

Do a yoga tree pose. Balance on one leg while placing the sole of your opposite foot along the inside of your standing leg. How long can you hold it? Try switching sides.

SING

All the Leaves are Falling Down

(Tune: London Bridge is Falling Down)
